Bob Majerus Director/Vice Treasurer It was a busy summer for MNHG, the Monarch Great Northern Depot, and the Neihart Fire Alarm Bell Tower project. The weather could have cooperated a little better this fall but we take what we get.

Historic Preservation Award. The Monarch Neihart Historical Group was awarded the 2019 Historic Preservation Award by the Cascade County/Great Falls Historic Preservation Advisory Commission for Outstand Restoration of the Great Northern Railway Monarch Depot. The award was presented after snacks and beverages at the Russell Museum in May. Others receiving awards were the C. M. Russell Home and the Collins Mansion.

Historic Great Northern Depot Restoration. Ticket office and waiting room walls once covered with bead board that had been damaged from the leaking roof or removed has been restored with bead board milled in Helena from vertical grain fir. A sample from the Depot was provided to **All Wood Designs** by MNHG for authentic restoration. Restored walls and doors will isolate the freight room from the waiting room and office which can be heated. The freight doors leak a great deal of air so that area will not be heated. Cost: \$8958.

Neihart Fire Alarm Bell Tower. Fund raising continues to erect a tower for Neihart's 450 pound fire alarm bell. Purchased in 1894 to replace an inadequate bell in use, the original 30 feet wood tower stood until 1945. To date, 48% of the cost has been raised. The bell was taken out of storage this summer and towed around Neihart and Monarch for fund raising. Each donor was allowed to ring the bell. Donations for this project can be made to MNHG, P.O. Neihart Sign Project. MNHG learned from the mayor of Neihart signs were needed at the Neihart gazebo kiosk to identify it as a Montana Department of Transportation historic point. The sign was made to resemble the highway marker and mounted on the gazebo. MNHG also welded a plaque to a post and buried the post in concrete in front of the 1920s Neihart jail. The sign identifies the family who donated the jail to the town of Neihart in memory of their son. Check out the signs at mnhg.org.

UPDATE: National Register of Historic Places Listing. The City/County Historic Preservation Officer is working with the Montana State Preservation Office on the Monarch Great Northern Depot application for the National Register. A draft of the application was sent to the State Preservation Office late summer and returned for editing. Editing has been completed and returned to Helena. Photographs will be taken soon to submit with the application.

New to the Depot Collection. Pictures of the Logging Creek Great Northern train stop have been scanned and added to the collection. Thanks to donors, we now have the Albright Collection, Monarch Collection, Logging Creek Collection, and the Hughesville Collection. These collections are available for viewing at the History Table during the Monarch Rocks Festival, August 8, 2020. Also available for reading is the book *Monarch at the Turn of the Century* by Maude Simonton whose father was Depot agent in Monarch in the late 1890s.

Spring snow storms. Montana can have some wet heavy spring snow storms so imagine traveling in 1894 after a spring storm. At the time of the following news article, Monarch and Neihart were located in Meagher County.

From the Neihart Herald: April 7, 1894. "A. D. Edwards had a grand old time passing the range between here and the county seat with the stage last Monday. He started from the Springs (White Sulphur Springs, ed.) at 5 a.m. and did not reach Neihart till 4 p.m. Tuesday, a distance of forty-two miles. He was alone with a two-horse team, and twenty pounds of mail, the only additional encumbrance being a No. 2 shovel of which the husky driver made vigorous use. Many times his whole outfit was upset, and once he unhitched the horses letting them slide into the creek before he could get them on their feet. It is a desperate road under present conditions."
